



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The Sonoma Valley Health Care District was formed in 1946 to provide healthcare services to Sonoma Valley residents. The Hospital is governed under the bylaws of the District with oversight by a publicly-elected Board of Directors. Directors serve four-year terms, with elections taking place during general elections for local, state or national offices. Monthly board meetings are open and public comment is welcomed. Meeting information is available at svh.com/Health Care District.

The District's mission is to maintain, improve and restore the health of everyone in the District, which encompasses the entire Sonoma Valley except for Kenwood. The hospital is supported primarily by revenues from services, augmented by taxpayer support in the form of a parcel tax, and by charitable bequests and donations. The Sonoma Valley Hospital Foundation plays an integral role in hospital fundraising efforts.

Navigating Through Challenging Times

The past few years have been disruptive ones for hospitals across the country. The American Hospital Association reports hospitals have been closing at the rate of around 30 per year, and a recent Morgan Stanley study reported more than 15 percent of US hospitals have weak financial metrics or are at risk of potential closure.

What is certain is that constant change will continue to be the norm in healthcare, and the impacts will always be amplified for small hospitals like ours. The competitive and insurance environments will continue to be harsh. Insurers will continue to press for lower reimbursement rates and curtailed inpatient stays, while regulators insist on increasing staffing mandates that are unfunded. Like it or not, this is the world that hospitals like ours must navigate through.

Our success in maintaining this incredibly important community asset will hinge on several factors:

- First and foremost, our hospital staff and physicians must continue to provide the highest quality of care to our community. This cannot change.
- Second, we must focus on providing the services most needed in our community that we can afford to provide. As public policy pursues the reduction of overall healthcare costs in the country, there is no longer room for hospital services with positive margins to subsidize those services that cannot cover their costs. This is the basis for the difficult decisions we have faced with Obstetrics and Home Care, and are evaluating with our Skilled Nursing Facility.
- We must continue to reduce costs and manage with a very streamlined administrative team (without sacrificing patient service and safety). Compared to other hospitals of similar size, our hospital's overhead is very low and must stay that way.
- We must continue to ask our community to support our hospital with a Parcel Tax and through philanthropy. While we all wish that this wasn't necessary, we can't maintain a hospital in our small community without these types of support.
- Finally, we must continue to create access to more healthcare services by recruiting and attracting additional physicians to the Valley. This has been a critical component of both our financial sustainability and providing local access to important services for our residents. UCSF will play an important role in accomplishing this.

With these priorities, I believe that our hospital will be able to thrive and continue to provide both the absolutely critical emergency services and a menu of important healthcare options for the community.

We have a lot of work ahead of us and much to be thankful for. Most importantly, I want to thank our community for the support it continues to show our hospital. As we face the challenges ahead, we will communicate frequently with our community and we encourage your input.

A Transitional Year For Our Hospital

Sonoma Valley Hospital has proudly served the health needs of our community for more than six decades. We are an important part of the fabric of our Valley, not just for our high-quality compassionate care, but also for the millions of dollars in economic impact we generate each year.

While the hospital has struggled financially and continues to rely on the parcel tax to support essential services like emergency, we also have made SVH a better hospital with the new Emergency Department and Surgery Center. Now, our affiliation with UCSF Health provides a strong partner for improving specialty care.

We are excited because we believe SVH is poised to become a new type of community hospital that will revitalize the way healthcare is provided in communities like ours. 2018 was a transitional year for our hospital as we moved toward this vision:

UCSF Affiliation. We formed an affiliation with one of the top hospitals in the nation and are collaborating to enhance quality of care at SVH. For example, the Emergency Department recently added UCSF telemedicine neurology services to help our physicians assess complex neurological problems. We plan to expand our access to their expertise by adopting more UCSF telemedicine services in the coming year.

Outpatient Diagnostic Center. We began design for a new Outpatient Diagnostic Center that will transform SVH's current imaging department, consolidating most diagnostic procedures in a modern setting with 21st Century technology. Importantly, it will expand our referral base by serving as the diagnostic center for UCSF patients in the North Bay. This project is being funded entirely through philanthropy.


Canopy Health. Our relationship with this dynamic Bay Area-wide health network is growing. Canopy is taking off as an alternative to Kaiser and other large healthcare systems and will help us increase our commercially insured patients. We are one of 18 hospitals in this system, which includes nearly 5,000 physicians.

Community Physician Clinics. In the past several years we have drawn more than 20 physician specialists to practice here and opened three clinics so they can see patients in town. We are working with UCSF to bring more specialists to Sonoma, including a cancer screening service next year under the direction of a world-renowned physician.

Commitment To Quality. Our high level of quality and safety is represented by the 4 Stars we received from Medicare, which uses a 5 Star rating system to rank hospitals. Working closely with UCSF, we have put in place plans to become a 5 Star Hospital in the near future, which fewer than one in 10 hospitals in the country achieve.

You can see why I say this is an exciting time for our hospital. Our goal is to make SVH a financially sustainable and technically excellent hospital that will serve this and the next generation of Sonoma Valley residents with the high level of compassionate care it has always provided. We are well on the way to doing so and I will keep you apprised of our progress in the year ahead.

UCSF Affiliation Moves Ahead

Sonoma Valley Hospital finalized a formal affiliation with UCSF Health this year, the topranked medical center in California and one of the top five hospitals in the nation.



Collaboration is taking shape in a number of areas. We are currently working together on


enhancing systems for quality of care at the hospital through Sabrina Kidd, MD, our new Chief Medical Officer and UCSF Medical Director. SVH will soon become stroke-certified with UCSF providing the tele-neurology services under the leadership of the UCSF Chair of Neurology, Dr. Andrew Josephson. We also expect that several of our physicians will become Affiliates of UCSF in the coming year. We will share more details as these and other possibilities evolve.

Canopy Health Network

SVH's new relationship with UCSF follows our joining Canopy Health, an affiliation between UCSF Health and John Muir Health, which has partnered with Western Health Advantage and other insurance companies to offer Bay Area employers a quality choice for health coverage. Members have access to in-network services within the entire Canopy Health alliance of nearly 5,000 providers and 18 hospitals across eight Bay Area counties, including SVH.



Strategic Vision For SVH



The hospital updated its rolling three-year strategic plan this year through a collaboration of board members, physicians and hospital leaders, and identified the following strategic priorities:

- 1. Achieve the highest levels of healthcare safety, quality and value as measured by star ratings
- 2. Be the preferred hospital for patients, physicians, health plans and employers as measured by volumes
- 3. Identify and implement new and enhanced revenue strategies and services as measured by direct margins
- 4. Continue to improve financial stability as measured by EBDA
- 5. Lead the progress toward being a healthier community as measured by health status

Our Emergency Department continues to **experience strong community use and high patient satisfaction.**Emergency had 11,103 patient visits in 2018 and 80% were seen within 15 minutes of arrival. RateMyHospital, which solicits patient feedback following a visit, reports patients rate our ED highly, giving it an **average score of 4.5 out of a possible 5.0**. Our ED recently added telemedicine services for neurology, which will assist in assessing complex stroke decisions, along with a telemedicine service for psychiatry. This real time access to specialists allows patients to be treated here without the need to transfer to another facility.

Diagnostic Upgrades Prepare SVH For The Future

This summer the District Board approved initial stage planning for a new Outpatient Diagnostic Services Center and efforts to upgrade several other parts of the hospital.

The new Outpatient Diagnostic Center is critical to the hospital's future success, reflecting the shift from inpatient to outpatient care while further strengthening core emergency and other services. More information on this new Center is available on pages 16 and 17.

The project will modernize and expand medical imaging and help SVH to stay relevant in the current healthcare environment while reducing costs and supporting revenue growth in the years ahead.

The plans for the new Diagnostic Center will transform SVH's current imaging department into a much more efficient layout that consolidates a number of our diagnostic procedures in one area, in a modern setting with state-of-the-art technology. Planned changes include a new 128-slice CT scanner and a new MRI.

The board also approved funding for a new master facility plan for the entire campus. This type of plan

needs to be done periodically and will be especially useful to the hospital as the demand for inpatient services continues to decline and the need for other, locally-delivered healthcare increases.

These projects are projected to increase revenue and enhance patient experience by improving outpatient reception and waiting areas, and providing direct access from the Emergency Department to the new CT scanner.

All costs for design, construction and new equipment will be covered by community donations and philanthropy raised by the Sonoma Valley Hospital Foundation.

State-Of-The-Art Mammography



As part of our expanded women's health services, the hospital installed a state-of-the-art 3D Mammography system in early 2018, thanks to generous community members and private foundations who donated the cost through the Sonoma Valley Hospital Foundation. The 3D system allows more careful examination of breast tissue, increasing cancer detection by over 40 percent while reducing the call-back rate for additional imaging.

Financial Report Restructuring for the Future

We continue to be impacted by healthcare industry changes, especially continued reductions in reimbursement. Fiscal year 2018 confirmed that the traditional hospital model is no longer viable, especially for small hospitals like ours, and heightened the need to reexamine core services to improve costs and operating margins. We are doing so aggressively and seeing progress. When you compare current operating costs with that of the industry, it's clear that SVH operates very efficiently.

SVH responded quickly early in the fiscal year as revenues began decreasing for almost every service line by reducing management and other expenses of \$1.5 million per year in December. Later, based on lowered financial projections, SVH was forced to make difficult decisions as we created the budget for FY 2019, recommending the closure of several services that were not fully utilized and could not cover direct costs.

The October fires were another factor. While many in Sonoma were evacuated, and others cancelled elective procedures, SVH's Emergency Department and Inpatient units remained open and the hospital experienced several weeks with below-normal revenue and volumes. This accounted for an additional loss of at least \$550,000 last year.


The most important ongoing concern affecting our financial viability is Kaiser, which has a large market share that is increasing, especially among the Medicare-eligible. One source

projects Kaiser with 42 percent market share in Sonoma County. Their presence continues to decrease the number of patients in the District who can use our services, except for Emergency, and increases SVH's reliance on governmental payers.

Medicare and Medi-Cal now represent 76 percent of hospital patient volume, coupled with a decrease in commercial volume, a trend that continues to grow. Not many hospitals can survive on government payments, but we have made strong efforts to become one of the few which are efficient enough to make it on Medicare. New payment models are emerging and SVH is a proud member of Canopy Health with UCSF and 17 other Bay Area hospitals.

The parcel tax vote in 2017 which increased the rate helped SVH survive 2018 and maintain essential services like Emergency, providing an additional \$800,000 of support.

Join Our Campaign

To ensure that our hospital can continue to provide us with the best possible care, we must care for our hospital today. The Sonoma Valley Hospital Foundation this year launched a campaign to fund a state-of-the-art Outpatient Diagnostic Center within the hospital.

This campaign is the critical next step in the master plan initiated with the 2014 renovation of our hospital's Emergency Department and Surgery Center. We are now moving ahead with the next phase by planning a central diagnostic hub to support every aspect of hospital care, from emergency to surgery and outpatient medicine.

It's vital that the hospital have advanced diagnostic imaging capabilities. Quick, accurate medical imaging is essential to many critical healthcare services the hospital offers, allowing physicians to see inside the body and offer accurate diagnoses.

This project is our chance to make the hospital a stronger resource for Sonomans of all ages and stages of life. When completed, we will have a hospital that is technically excellent, accessible, and – with advanced diagnostic capabilities that contribute to our hospital's bottom line – stronger financially. It will also strengthen our affiliation with UCSF by creating improved diagnostic access for their North Bay patients.

The hospital plans to repurpose the vacant space left by the old ER and Surgery Department, and incorporate adjacent space, to create a 20,000-square-foot diagnostic hub that supports state-of-the-art imaging, all within our hospital's current footprint. The campaign will fund all improvements including new equipment, remodeling, expansion, and a seismic upgrade.

This new initiative is being funded entirely through the generosity of donors. No hospital operating funds are being used. We invite you to contribute at whichever level is most comfortable to help create this important addition to our hospital.

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

Transforming Care In Our Community

CT scanner, ultrasound, MRI, X-ray – diagnostic capabilities like these are the backbone of hospital care, lifesavers in emergencies, and essential for every surgery. But these technologies evolve rapidly. Sonoma Valley Hospital's imaging capabilities are housed in facilities built for a bygone era and some vital equipment must be replaced. So much more is possible through modern medicine. With your support, we can bring these possibilities to Sonoma today. This project creates operational efficiencies, increases revenue, and positions SVH to maintain a financially viable independent hospital and meet the needs of our community for years to come. It also will serve as the diagnostic service for UCSF in the North Bay.



BEFORE

CT scanners are critical in diagnosing and evaluating a patient's condition and are vital in emergencies. SVH currently uses a 64-slice CT scanner that must be upgraded.

AFTER

A 128-slice CT scanner, with improved access to the Emergency Department, will provide a more reliable, detailed view of the body, crucial in cardiac evaluation and life-saving emergency care.

BFFORF

Essential to diagnosis and care, particularly in the brain, MRI machines can be claustrophobic. Currently, visitors must walk outside to a trailer for this specialized equipment.

AFTER

Our diagnostic hub will include state-of-theart MRI capabilities, with improved imaging and patient-friendly design. And no need for an umbrella to travel to the trailer in the rain!

BEFORE

Diagnostic and imaging have been housed in four locations inside and two locations outside the hospital.

AFTER

All diagnostic services will be located in an easily accessible hub within the current hospital footprint, using space repurposed from our former ER and Surgery areas.

BEFORE

Women who required a biopsy, ultrasound, or bone density scan after a mammogram had to travel three blocks from the breast health center to the main hospital.

AFTER

In keeping with hospital best practices, stateof-the-art mammography, ultrasound, bone scan and other diagnostic support is available within steps of each other.

BEFORE

Diagnostic imaging – a critical revenue stream for the hospital – relies on aging equipment and antiquated facilities.

AFTER

A new Diagnostic Center results in increased net revenue of \$1.5 million annually. There will be no need for physicians to refer patients beyond Sonoma. Recent investments have given us exceptional new emergency and surgical facilities. Now it's time to update one of the most important features of the hospital – the advanced imaging technology so essential to modern hospital care.
